Overview of Recent Work

Food's relationship to war and conflict is complex and multidimensional. Lack of food can drive conflict when resources are limited. Farmers who flee their land cannot plant or harvest. Too often they become displaced and find themselves in need of humanitarian aid. Food can also become a weapon of war when governments and armed groups alike use it to deprive citizens of the most basic human need. One of the places where this relationship is especially apparent is in refugee and diaspora kitchens, where food provides a connection to one's homeland, but also a means of survival.

In today's world of food–from agricultural sciences to culinary diplomacy and gastrodiplomacy–many forces are converging to create the field of social gastronomy. One of the leading voices in this emerging discipline is Johanna Mendelson Forman. She sees the kitchen as a new venue of foreign policy. With over three decades of experience with international policymaking, Johanna has observed firsthand the close connections between conflict, food, and identity, which she brings to this new perspective on the nexus of food and conflict.

Her frontline experience as a policy maker on conflict and stabilization efforts drove her interest in connecting the role of food in conflict, resulting in the creation of *Conflict Cuisine*: an *Introduction to War and Peace around the Dinner Table*, an interdisciplinary course that she teaches at the School of International Service at American University in Washington, DC. As an Adjunct Professor leading this new innovative curriculum, Mendelson Forman challenges her students to explore new ways of looking at diplomacy, conflict resolution, and civic engagement, and how food, as a form of Smart Power, can drive these issues in the 21st century. By establishing this link between food and conflict, Mendelson Forman developed a new interdisciplinary platform examining why food is central to survival and resilience in conflict zones.

A member of the Council on Foreign Relations, Mendelson Forman also serves as a Distinguished Fellow and Director of Food Security with the Managing Across Boundaries Program at the Stimson Center, a Washington, D. C. think tank. She is also is an Adjunct Professor at the School of International Service at American University where she teaches Conflict Cuisine.

Mendelson Forman has focused her career on post-conflict transition, civil military relations, and democratization, concentrating on the Americas, specifically Central America, the Caribbean, and Brazil. She has wide-ranging field experience on post-conflict transitions in Haiti, Guatemala, Colombia, Iraq, and throughout Sub-Saharan Africa, having served as a Senior Advisor for Humanitarian Response at the U.S. Agency for International Development, where she helped to establish the Office of Transition Initiatives. Mendelson Forman has served as the Director of Peace, Security, and Human Rights at the United Nations Foundation, Senior Advisor to the United Nations Mission in Haiti, and with the World Bank's Post-Conflict Unit. Currently, she is a Senior Advisor at the Stimson Center, where she works on food security. She has also held academic appointments at Georgetown University, the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, and American University's School of International Service.

Mendelson Forman has written extensively about security and conflict and about Latin America. More than fifty articles, three co-edited books, and numerous opinion pieces express the breadth of her interests over the course of her career. More recently she has added many articles about food and culinary diplomacy. Her work has been published in a wide-range of publications including, the Miami Herald, Washington Post, Americas Quarterly, The Globalist, VOXXI, Estadao, El Universal, and World Politics Review, and has been cited in NPR's The Salt, LeFigaro, Salon, Italia Oggi, and This Week. She frequently appears on national media including National Public Radio, Univision, and CNN.

Mendelson Forman has lectured on food-related topics at the Smithsonian Resident Associates Program, Johns Hopkins University Bologna Campus, and New York University's Washington Program, at the United States Pavilion during the 2015 World Expo in Milan, Italy, the MAD Food Symposium in Copenhagen, and the World Economic Forum, Latin America. She has delivered keynote addresses at Les Dames D'Escoffier, the Society for Nutrition Behavior, and at the World Affairs Council.
